

## ♠♥♦♣ A PERPLEXING SITUATION ♠♥♦♣

You have dealt yourself this nice hand. You open 1♠.

S	South
♠	AKJ72
♥	KQ43
♦	65
♣	A2

With silent opponents, your partner responds 2♠. What is your call?

When your partner raises you to 2 of your major, it is a time to use Losing Trick Count. You count the losers among the first 3 cards in each suit. Thus, you have 1 spade loser (the ♠Q), 1 heart loser (the ♥A), 2 diamond losers and 1 club loser; 5 in all. That means you can take 8 tricks in your hand alone and you only need 2 from partner to make game. His single raise usually promises 2 "cover cards". These are cards that can eliminate one of your losers. With a 5 loser hand, assuming partner's hand can reduce that to 3 losers, jump to game over a single raise.

With a 7 loser hand, which is the normal minimum opening hand, just pass. There is no hope that partner can have 4 cover cards. With a 6 loser hand, invite to game using some sort of a game try bid. Partner will know you have a 6 loser count and if he has 3 cover cards, he will jump to game, otherwise he will return to your suit at the 3-level.

You are at 4♠ and West leads the ♣K. Plan your play.

N	North
♠	Q65
♥	A65
♦	Q73
♣	9654

East leads ♣K

Notice that North did provide 2 cover cards – The ♥A and the ♠Q. The queen is not normally a cover card, but when it is in the trump suit, it serves to solidify the trump situation and is counted as a cover card. You do not count the ♦Q as a cover card.

You want to count your losers. You have 2 diamond and 1 club loser, for sure. The spades are solid but the 4<sup>th</sup> heart might present a problem.

Since there are 5 spades outstanding you will need to pull them 3 times. However, if you do that first, you will have to depend on a 3-3 break in hearts to make your contract. That is only a 35% probability. If you don't pull trump at all, the defenders may ruff one of your top hearts. Here a compromise is called for. You must keep 1 spade in the dummy to trump the 4<sup>th</sup> heart if they do not break evenly. So, you can afford to pull exactly 2 rounds of trump. Remember to leave the ♠Q in the dummy so you cannot be overruffed by East if he is short of hearts.

You want to win the initial lead with your ♣A and turn to the trump immediately. You will find the hearts break 4-2, so your preserved ♠Q was required after all.
