

♠♥♦♣ DON'T TAKE UNNECESSARY CHANCES ♠♥♦♣

East is the dealer and passes. This is your hand:

S	South
♠	AJ10763
♥	KJ
♦	92
♣	A95

With 13 HCP and a six-card spade suit, you open 1♠. The opponents are quiet and partner responds 2NT. This is a conventional bid showing 4 or more spades and 13 or more points. It is called "Jacoby 2NT." With this South hand, you would show shortness by bidding that suit at the 3-level; or extra points (18+) by bidding 3♠. With this hand, however, you want to show a weak opener and use the "fast arrival" rebid of 4♠. This ends the auction. West lead the ♦4. What is your plan?

Counting your losers, you have no spade losers, but you do have 1 heart loser, 1 diamond loser and 2 club losers. You might eliminate a diamond loser if the finesse of the ♦Q works. But if it loses, East might switch to clubs. Now, you will surely go down. When you lose to the ♥A, the opposition will cash their two clubs and that will be a 1-trick set.

Another option is to eliminate a loser on the long heart suit. By driving out the ♥A, the ♥Q will provide a parking place for a diamond or club. But you must do

this before they knock out your club stopper. This means you cannot afford to chance the diamond finesse. You must win the $\heartsuit A$ immediately, pull trump making sure there is a high trump left in the dummy, and force the $\heartsuit A$. Once they take their $\heartsuit A$, there is nothing that can stop you from taking your 10 tricks.
