

## PLAN FOR THE OVERTRICKS

You are dealt the following hand as South:

South  
 ♠ Q6  
 ♥ Q108  
 ♦ J52  
 ♣ KJ763

You are the dealer, with favorable vulnerability. You pass in first seat but your partner opens 1♠. Your RHO doubles and you should make the same bid you would make if there was no double. You aren't strong enough to show your 5-card club suit so all you can do is respond 1NT. West passes and your partner rebids his spades. 2♠ tends to show a 6-card spade suit with a minimum strength hand. East passes and so should you. You have a flat hand with your jacks and queens distributed throughout. You should feel fortunate to be able to play in a low part score.

East leads the ♣10 and you must take over for North:

Sitting North, you count your losers. Outside the trump suit, you have 2 heart and 2 diamond losers. That means you must limit your spade losers to only 1. This requires a 3-2 trump split and the ♠K to be in East. Another possibility is a setup of the club suit. That will require a 3-3 club break because of the paucity of dummy entries.

Win the first club in your hand and lead a low spade to dummy's ♠Q and hold your breath. Say East rises with the ♠K. That's was good news as long as the split is 3-2. East will lead another club which you

will win. You can pull another round of trump with your ♠Q. Both opponents follow. Take another risk and lead the third club, ruffing in your hand. Again, both opponents will follow.

Now you can see a path for an overtrick. Pull the last trump and lead the ♥K. East will win and lead the ♦A and another diamond which West will win with his ♦K. Whatever West leads, you can win and claim 9 tricks. There was probably more skill than luck here but in a match point duplicate game, overtricks count so much. When you do your planning, think about not only making your contract but taking overtricks as well.
