WHEN TO AVOID THE SLAM

I was sitting South with this hand in a recent game on iBridgePlus, the bridge playing App available at the Apple App Store:




East dealt and I would have opened this South hand 2♠ if East hadn't beat me to the punch. I am too strong to overcall. My 8-card heart suit is worth about 15 points. The diamonds add another 7 points. I must double and then bid my hearts over partner's response. This is called the Type II or the Big Double, and shows a hand of 18+ points. The problem is that the bidding of 1♥ over 1♦ is not forcing. I definitely don't want to be passed with this hand. The expert solution is to jump to 2♥. This promises 6+ hearts and is forcing for one round. Cue bidding 2♠ and then bidding hearts would also be strong but doesn't promise more than five hearts.

After West inserted a raise of his partner's clubs, my partner made a positive response supporting my hearts. Now I can add about 5 more points. This hand is definitely slam worthy. The only problem is that I could lose the first two club tricks. I can find out if partner has 1st or 2nd round control of clubs by starting a control cue bid sequence. I started with 3♠, the next suit up the line. Partner ignored West's 4♠ and retreated to 4♥. That meant he doesn't have club or diamond control. He could have doubled to show club control. I didn't bother to check on aces and just passed the game contract.

West leads the ♣10 and you I saw this dummy:



West led the ♣10. I have just two losers, the spade and club aces. The lead was won by East's ♠K, and he switched to diamonds. This gave me an opportunity to make overtricks. Overtricks are particularly important in 'match point' games. I noticed that I have the ♠Q in the dummy on which I can pitch my losing ♠J.

I won trick 2 in hand and pulled the outstanding two trump with the ♥A. I then unblocked the ♦A and went to the dummy in hearts to play the ♦Q, discarding the ♠J from my hand. I then claimed with 2 overtricks. Of course, if I were in slam, East would have taken the ♠A before he switched to diamonds on trick 2. I can't blame him for waiting to capture the dummy's ♠K in our game contract.
